Lent and Joy to Come

Wednesday 5th March is Ash Wednesday, marking the start of the most serious season in the Church's calendar: Lent. In the very early days of the Church Lent may have followed the Epiphany, which finishes forty days after Christmas. But Lent soon became attached to Easter, which was the principal occasion for baptism and for the reconciliation of those who had been excluded from the Church's fellowship, and for which Lent prepared both groups.

This history explains the characteristic notes of Lent – self-examination, penitence, self-denial, study, and preparation for Easter, to which almsgiving has traditionally been added.

As the candidates for baptism were instructed in Christian faith during Lent, and as penitents prepared themselves through fasting and penance, to be readmitted to communion, the whole Christian community was invited to join them in the process of study and repentance, the extension of which, over forty days, would remind them of the forty days that Jesus spent in the wilderness, being tested by Satan.

Ashes are an ancient sign of penitence; from the Middle Ages it became the custom to begin Lent by being marked in ash with the sign of the cross. The calculation of the forty days has varied considerably in Christian history. It is now usual in the West to count them continuously

to the end of Holy Week (not including Sundays) so beginning Lent on the sixth Wednesday before Easter, Ash Wednesday.

The Fourth Sunday of Lent (Laetare or Refreshment Sunday), which falls on the last Sunday in March this year, was allowed as a day of relief from the rigour of Lent, and the Feast of the Annunciation almost always falls in Lent. These breaks from austerity are the background to the modern observance of Mothering Sunday on the Fourth Sunday of Lent. Please join us at Warnford for our Mothering Sunday Family Service. There will be an opportunity to take communion, if you wish.

Notwithstanding some Feast Days, including the Annunciation, and the relaxation on Mothering Sunday, the tone of Lent is austere, so our emergence into the great joy of Easter Day feels all the more powerful. So it is not surprising that those candidates for baptism in the early Church were instructed in Christian faith during Lent and then all the baptisms occurred on Easter morning amid much celebration and singing of many an 'alleluia'.

We have had a spell of many funerals across our parishes when it has been right to celebrate the lives of those we are missing, but it has been sad. After our own sombre season, we, like the early baptism candidates at the end of Lent, are emerging into a season of joy, as we prepare for several baptisms over the weeks and months ahead.

Baptism marks the beginning of a journey with God which continues for the rest of our lives, the first step in response to God's love. For all involved, particularly the candidates but also parents, godparents and sponsors, it is a joyful moment when we rejoice in what God has done for us in Christ, making serious promises and declaring the faith. The whole church community and friends welcome the new Christian, promising support and prayer for the future.

The service, with many features of the earliest baptism services, paints many vivid pictures. Just as in Lent we began with the signing of the cross with ashes, in baptism our lifelong journey begins with signing of the cross with holy oils. The sign of the cross is our badge of faith in the Christian journey.

Water is a sign of new life, as we are born again by water and the Spirit. This reminds us of Jesus' baptism and of his resurrection to new life, so we too may have new life in him.

As a sign of that new life, we also have the Easter (Paschal) candle lit, a picture of the light of Christ conquering the darkness of evil. It is from this that the baptism candles for the newly baptised are also lit. Everyone who is baptized walks in that light for the rest of their lives.

Jesus said, 'I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.'

Please consider praying for those who are to be baptised in our parishes as countless others



have in the centuries before them, picture them with yourself and the whole Church throughout the ages, journeying into the fullness of God's love.

May your Lent, however you mark it, even if just noticing the beauty of the world as the days lengthen (the word Lent has a common origin in the word 'lengthening') fill your hearts with a profound sense of an expected jo, soon to come,y just as it does for us as we anticipate Easter Day.

New Church Electoral Rolls

As is taking place all over the country this Spring a new Church Electoral Roll is being prepared for both West Meon and Warnford parishes. This is a register of baptised members of the Church of England aged over 16. It gives lay members a voice in the synodical government of the church. This starts at parish level by those on the electoral roll electing the parochial church council and those members go on to elect deanery synods who elect both diocesan and the general synod. This gives members a role in making decisions that affect what goes on in your local church and ultimately in your national church.

Although the rolls are revised every year, every six years we have to make a completely new one and those on the old roll are not carried forward onto the new roll unless they fill in the application form. This form will be found as a centre page in this magazine and extra copies will be available in the shop and the churches.

As West Meon is holding its annual parochial church meeting on Sunday 27th April, application to West Meon's electoral roll can be made from 23rd February to 7th April. Please give completed forms to Louise Clay or leave in the box provided in West Meon church. For Warnford please contact Gerry Corden.

West Meon CE Primary School

The days of winter begin to recede as we enter the first spring month of March. At West Meon school staff no longer arrive and leave in the dark; we can stop for a while in the church grounds, breathe in the crisp early morning air, and take a moment to be grateful for the environment in which we work.

This month schools across the country take part in the highly popular World Book Day. At West Meon School, we organise a Book Week which includes activities all week based around reading and the enjoyment of books. This year we are introducing our 'Extreme reading Challenge' in which children are encouraged to capture an image of themselves reading in a very unusual position or venue. We are looking forward to sharing some of those on our website later this month.

February was a busy time for the children and adults at West Meon Primary. Owls class have been studying topological maps and investigating how that transfers to real life. They have explored the way hills and mountains



are represented on an OS map and used that knowledge as they walked up Old Winchester Hill. From that vantage point, the students were able to make links between the countryside and their map – what a great use of our natural surroundings. Hedgehogs class, our youngest



members, took a joyful trip to the beautiful Snowdrop Walk at Warnford. A great excursion for these pupils and an occasion to experience an 'awe and wonder' moment. As a Church of England school, we seek out opportunities to immerse our children in the delights of the world around us and use those moments to reflect on our place in it. The children took part in some observational drawing and also investigated puddles – which was a great hit!

If you have links with our school (which in our village community many do) you may be aware we had our inspection visit from Ofsted this half term. At the time of writing we are unable to comment on the outcome, however I feel it should be acknowledged how amazing our pupils are. They were able to speak to the inspectors with authority about

their school while displaying our core values of Respect, Courage and Creativity throughout the two days of the inspection. As soon as we are able, we will happily share the final report.

An Ofsted visit does not stop the continued progress of the school and we are constantly arranging training opportunities and sharing good practice to enhance the provision we offer. The team at West Meon are dedicated to providing the best educational experience for children so that they leave us well prepared for their next step at secondary school.

With spring tapping at the door, both children and adults feel revitalised and ready to learn in an environment that has so much to offer. *Julie Slamaker, Headteacher*

Turning over stones, one turnstone at a time

The Turnstones are fascinating shorebirds which are easily recognisable due to their distinctive behaviour and striking plumage. The scientific name of the bird, Arenaria interpres, refers to its unique habit of 'turning' over stones and debris in search of food, so is of course, where the name 'turnstone' originates.

During the winter months, these medium-sized waders are a common sight along the shores of Hampshire, particularly in places like Langstone Harbour, the Solent, and along the Isle of Wight's coast.

Despite weighing only around 100g, the turnstone is a remarkable migrant, traveling incredible distances during its seasonal migration. Originating from breeding grounds in northern regions such as Lapland, Greenland, and even as far as Canada, these waders make long, arduous journeys - sometimes covering up to 1,700 miles - to reach their wintering sites.

Turn over for more!

The UK serves as a crucial stopover on their migratory route, a pit stop to rest and refuel before continuing their journey further south to Africa. These passage migrants rely on the UK's coastal habitats to sustain them during this critical phase of their migration. Although a migrant to the UK, it can also be seen all year-round as different populations arrive throughout the seasons.

The birds seek out the rocky shorelines, tidal mudflats, and sandy beaches where they feed primarily on small invertebrates, crustaceans, and molluscs, often flipping over small rocks and shells with their strong bills to uncover hidden prey.

The turnstones striking plumage changes with the seasons. In summer, their feathers are rich with orange, black, and white tones, making them particularly noticeable against the backdrop of coastal scenery. In winter, their plumage becomes more muted, offering them better camouflage among the pebbles and rocks they scavenge.

They are widely recognised by different names across countries due to their unique habits and widespread distribution. In addition to turnstone, it is also sometimes called the 'sea quail' in coastal communities, referencing its stout build and patterned plumage. In North America,



there is also a second species, the 'black turnstone', which lives on the Pacific coast.

Their long-distance migration is a testament to the turnstone's resilience and adaptability. The birds offer a powerful reminder of the interconnectedness of global ecosystems and the importance of preserving coastal habitats for migratory species.

Conservation efforts are essential to protecting their habitats and ensuring that future generations will continue to enjoy the sight of these fascinating birds in the wild.

Rainfall report for January to mid-February

January rainfall ended with 156.4mm (6.15"). February has been a relatively dry month so far giving just 12.8mms (0.5"). The total for the year to mid February is 169.2.mms (6.58"). This compares with 165.7mms (6.52") in 2024.

If you wonder why things are growing very slowly this year, in February last year the average maximum temperature was 10.9C and the average minimum was 4.2C while this year they are so far 6.8C and 1.1C and the average soil temperature last year was 7.1C and this year only 4.2C, actually colder than this January. It can only get warmer, hopefully. Another statistic: the average rainfall this February per day is 1.0 mm and last year it was 6.9mm. *Peter Short*
