Through Lent to Easter: Give up? No, take up! Look for new life.

The stock of Easter Eggs in many shops may have us setting our sights on longer, sunnier Spring days and lambs, or perhaps on a chocolate-fuelled long weekend or, for many of us, on the second great Christian festival of the Liturgical Year, Easter. But, four of the six weeks of Lent and Passiontide fall in March before we reach the Easter festivities.

Much of March falls in the penitential and reflective season before we reach the triumphant joy of Easter. I write 'penitential' as the theological sense of this word includes turning afresh to new life as we prepare for Easter. Lent is about self-examination, repentance, self-denial, study and almsgiving. Self-sacrifice and service to others need not be restricted to Lent, but Lent can focus our attention on others rather than self. But how can these make a bigger difference to us and to others?

A few years ago, I was moved by the efforts of a retired army officer, his son and one of his son's friends. They were walking the South Downs Way 'like tramps' relying on the kindness of others for food and shelter – a comparative luxury for them was sleeping on cold church





floors, including one of mine on a very wet and cold night. They did this to raise money and awareness for the homeless and ex-service personnel suffering from PTSD. I was also impressed by a young fundraiser from Great Ormonde Street Hospital, who stood shivering on doorsteps in freezing rain one January to ask us to give to the hospital that helps some local children as well as others from further afield. Most worthwhile things take effort but the subsequent reward goes beyond pecuniary return and even praise. The effort itself revitalizes our inner selves as well as helping those we seek to support.

Lent may be less about giving something up, but more about denying the self by taking something up for the sake of others, like the 'tramps'. It does not have to be a great physical effort! For instance...

Could you support one of our local schools by:

- praying for them,
- baking a cake for the staff once or twice a term, or
- listening to a child read once a week, as some of you already do.

Could you help our church communities by:

- assisting with the admin or upkeep, or with the flowers, or reading in church?
- joining a PCC?
- singing, or supporting social activities or fundraising in and around the churches? Could you help another part of our community somehow?

Please share your ideas for reaching out to those around us who are lonely or need a helping hand, just as so many people in villages so often do when they hear of a need.

There is so much that can be shared and, whatever your gift, taking up something in Lent may serve others better than giving something up - it might make us feel better too.

We always look forward to the slight relaxation in the strictures of Lent on the Fourth Sunday (Laetare or Refreshment Sunday) on 10th March and the Annunciation on 25th March, which give us the roots of Mothering Sunday. So, do please join us for one of our special services on or around Mothering Sunday, when the traditional and the informal meet together, with young and old celebrating as one.



On Palm Sunday (24th March), we come together to begin the solemn celebration of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and his sacrifice on the Cross for all of us. We do this in union with the Church throughout the world – a powerful thought in these times of separation and conflict. Christ entered Jerusalem to complete his work, to suffer, to die, and

to rise again. This year, we walk from Warnford to our service in West Meon to commemorate this great event.

Throughout the forty days after Easter, taking us through April into May, we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus and his defeat of the power of sin and death. What a wonderfully varied few weeks, at a time when the world around is changing its character so beautifully.

W.I. Report

At our meeting on Monday 12th February, our speaker was John Richards, a Guernseyman himself gave us a fascinating insight into the German occupation of Guernsey from 30th June 1940 until liberation on 9th May 1945.

On 15th June after the Allied defeat in France the British Government decided the Channel Islands were of no strategic importance and would not be defended – they were therefore demilitarised in order to protect the population but unfortunately the Germans were not told and this resulted in a number of deaths when a convoy of lorries queuing at St. Peter Port to export tomatoes were mistaken for troop carriers.

On 16th June the evacuation of the Guernsey population hurriedly began but it proved impossible to evacuate everyone who wanted to leave – in total 5000 children and 12000 adults were evacuated and the last official boat left on 23rd June.

The Germans instigated a curfew from 9pm-6.30am and cars were confiscated. The population did their best to thwart the German occupiers by taking down road signs, putting potatoes up vehicle exhausts and pouring sugar into petrol tanks so that very quickly the Kommondant issued a proclamation threatening the death penalty for such transgressions. Fishing boats were allowed out to sea but very soon they started disappearing so that the Germans insisted a soldier accompanied every boat – this did not last long as soldiers started to "mysteriously fall overboard and drown due to their heavy equipment".

As the war progressed civilian life became increasingly harsh – food, fuel and medicines were very scarce. The slave workers which the Germans imported from the rest of Europe to build fortifications had a particularly hard time.

By the time the Allies launched the D-Day Landings in Normandy in 1944 the islanders and Germans alike were on the point of starvation and it took months of negotiations before the Red Cross were able to send a supply boat to relieve the islanders in December 1944.

The Channel islands were finally liberated on 9th May 1945.

Our next meeting will be held at West Meon Village Hall on Monday 11th March at 2pm, where we will play the Jury at a murder trial. Our speaker is Steve Herra and the title of his talk is 'The Body Through the Porthole' - this sounds like that we should be in for a fascinating afternoon! We look forward to seeing you there.

Damp and mould in a rental property

Damp and mould can build up in any house but when it's a rental property it can be frustrating trying to get it sorted out.

You've done the right thing by bringing this to your landlord. To work out if they are responsible, you'll need to find the cause of the damp and mould, but this can take time unless there's a clear cause, like bad insulation or a leaking roof.

Damp is when an area of your property doesn't dry out, often because it's cold. The main types are rising, penetrating, construction, and condensation damp. It can lead to mould, which is a fungus that grows in areas where warm damp air condenses on cold surfaces, like window frames.

You should also check your written statement for mentions of repairs and damp. Your landlord is responsible for fixing a damp problem if it's making your home unsafe to live in. For example, this could be if it's affecting your health or the health of those you live with. Your landlord will also be responsible if the damp is related to repairs they should have carried out, like if the window frames are rotting. They would have to cover the cost of repairs to any items damaged by the damp, including carpets and furniture.

Condensation is a key cause of damp we're all familiar with. Keeping homes well-heated and well-ventilated is the best way to prevent this, but for many of us today, high heating costs and cold weather are making this very difficult. Annual Parish Meeting

The APM for West Meon will be on Thursday April 18th at the Sports Pavilion. All parishioners can attend and raise questions with members of the Parish Council, District and County Council. The APM will also include the AGM of the Village Hall Committee. The proceedings will start at 7.00pm with refreshments and the meeting will start at 7.30pm.

Speed data

WMPC has been supporting the independent WM Speed Awareness Group by starting to collect data on vehicle speeds within the parish. The trial device on East End road adjacent to Meadow House produced no useful data as the 30MPH limit was not recorded as being breached during the trial period. A second small scale data collection was recorded near the old non working flashing 30MPH sign on approaching WM along the A32 from the South. Over the recording period, some 38% of vehicles approached the speed recorder at between 20MPH and 35MPH, significantly some 61% approached the recorder at between 35MPH and 55MPH. What speeds the vehicles were travelling at once they rounded Warnford Corner is not known. WMPC will continue to collect data from across the parish.

Bus service changes

WMPC would encourage all parishioners to continue to deluge the County Council and Stagecoach wilth demands for the current level of service for the 67 bus to be maintained. If you can increase your use of the service then all the better.

Fly tipping and litter on the A32

WMPC members noted the disgusting state of the A32 verges, particularly of late, and are contacting Winchester City Council about this. WMPC would encourage all parishioners who note excess litter or fly tipping to report it using the online portals or by contacting the Clerk. For fly tipping report at https://www.winchester.gov.uk/waste-recycling/flytipping or ring 0300 300 0013. For litter on the verge, please report at https://www.winchester.gov.uk/apply. You need to select 'Report Litter/Street Cleaning'. This then takes you to the Your Winchester log-in page. If you don't have an account you will either need to set one up or report in a different way (call 0300 300 0013 or, if you are really struggling, e-mail the Clerk).

Flood Action Group

As previously reported, progress is being made with this group to try and better alleviate flooding by the River Meon, especially at East End. Next steps include collecting data about the volumes of water in the river and likely blockage points. As the work unfolds, parishioners will be kept informed.

Salt bin on Marlands Lane/Old Road

This will be filled as soon as possible.

THE FUTURE OF THE MUSEUM Many of you will have heard about the financial constraints affecting the County Council - a shortfall of £132 million. Hampshire Cultural Trust, which operates the Curtis Museum and Allen Gallery, is severely affected. The Gallery is safe, thanks to the ambitious new project Rediscovering the Allen Gallery. This plan is looking to receive further funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund and has already had financial support confirmed by East Hampshire District Council and Alton Town Council.

The Museum, alas, is under threat of closure in 2026. We who are involved management, volunteers and visitors - are hoping the Museum can be saved. It is an important repository for the area's history - from ancient fossils, Anglo-Saxon treasures, Civil War artifacts, - to Jane Austen and the Brewing industry.
